PUBLIC COMMUNICATIONS

- Rick Eng, representing LA vs. Hate Program, President of the Los Angeles Chapter of the Chinese American Citizens Alliance (CACAA), and member of the Monterey Park Healing Fund stated that he received sympathy and condolence cards/letters in wake of the January mass casualty incident from students at Rutgers University's student organization known as Queer and Asian Alliance. 3-B. 2021-2022 ANNUAL COMPREHENSIVE FINANCIAL REPORT

The City's auditor, CliftonLarsonAllen LLP (CLA), an independent auditor and one of the nation's leading CPA firms, completed the audit of the City's annual financial statements for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022. The audited financial statements are incorporated into an ACFR.

This is the 7th year, CLA audited the City's financial records. The auditor issued an unmodified ("clean") opinion on the City's financial statements. An unmodified opinion indicates that the financial data of the City is fairly presented in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (or "GAAP") and the standards applicable to the financial audits contained in Government Audit Standards, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. These standards require that the auditors plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance as to whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement and accurately reflects the City's financial position. Additionally, the auditors' report does not indicate any negative findings, internal control deficiencies or instances of noncompliance with applicable laws and regulations.

Discussion: Director of Finance Garcia provided a PowerPoint Presentation summarizing the city's ACFR and was available for questions.

3-C. AUTHORIZING MAYOR TO SIGN A LETTER ON BEHALF OF THE CITY SUPPORTING ASSEMBLY BILLS 1406 (MCCARTY) AND 1420 (BERMAN)

On January 21, 2023, the City of Monterey Park experienced a Mass Casualty Incident (MCI) where 20 people were shot. Eleven of those community members died. As our community struggles with the challenge of working through this tragedy, fellow citizens and residents in California and the rest of the country continue to be confronted with substantially similar MCIs.

Action Taken: The City Council authorized the Mayor to sign a letter on the City's behalf supporting Assembly Bill (AB) 1406 (McCarty) and AB 1420 (Berman), on Consent Calendar.

3-D. LAND ACKNOWLEDGMENT STATEMENT

A Land Acknowledgment is a statement that recognizes and respects Indigenous Peoples as traditional stewards of lands, expresses gratitude and appreciation to those groups, and honors the Indigenous people who have lived and worked on the land for centuries. Land Acknowledgments are a common practice in both Australia and Canada and are increasingly being adopted by city, county, and state governments in the United States.

Staff met with representatives from the Gabrieleño/Tongva San Gabriel Band of Mission Indians to learn more about their recommendations for Land Acknowledgment language and practices. Based on our discussions, staff proposes the following Land Acknowledgment statement which has been reviewed and approved by the Gabrieleño/Tongva San Gabriel Band of Mission Indians:

We would like to acknowledge that the land we inhabit today was once known as Tovangaar, the home of the Gabrieleño-Tongva people. We show our respect to the Gabrieleño-Tongva people, as well as all Indigenous people, past, present, and future, and honor their labor as original caretakers of this land. We commit to uplifting the Gabrieleño-Tongva people, invite you to acknowledge the history, and join us in caring for this land.

Public Speakers:

- Mona Morales Recalde, member of the San Gabriel Band of Mission Indians, partnered with the City to draft a Land Acknowledgement statement. She stated that this statement acknowledges that the ancestral land in which the City is on is Gabrieleño/Tongva land. She requested the City Council's consideration in adopting the Land Acknowledgement.

Action Taken: The City Council approved and adopted a Land Acknowledgement statement as amended to add the Land Acknowledgement language to all public meeting agendas and for it to be read at city events.

3-I. WAIVE FURTHER READING AND ADOPT AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE 13, CHAPTER 12 OF THE MONTEREY PARK MUNICIPAL CODE (“MPMC”) IN ITS ENTIRETY TO REGULATE ENCROACHMENTS WITHIN THE PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY

MPMC Chapter 13.12 regulates encroachments and construction within all public right of ways within the City. The regulations under this chapter were first implemented in the 1980s and are stale in comparison to industry standards. The proposed ordinance updates regulations for excavations and encroachments on, over, and under public rights-of-ways and public service easements.

The Ordinance was introduced and received first reading at the April 19, 2023 City Council meeting. The original staff report (from April 19, 2023) is attached to the staff report for reference. Second reading and adoption of this Ordinance is recommended. If adopted, the Ordinance will take effect in 30 days.

Action Taken: The City Council waived the second reading and adopted Ordinance No. 2229, on Consent Calendar.

3-J. CALIFORNIA ENERGY COMMISSION CALIFORNIA AUTOMATED PERMIT PROCESSING (CALAPP) PROGRAM GRANT

The California Energy Commission's CalAPP Grant Program, funded by \$20 million from the California Budget Act of 2021 authorized by Senate Bill 129, is intended to help cities and counties establish an online, automated solar permitting system. The City qualifies for a \$60,000 grant to reimburse the City for staff or consultant time associated with implementing the solar permitting software, among others. Expediting solar permits will help the City comply with the Solar Access Act and will advance the City's Going Green efforts towards promoting sustainability within the City.

The application deadline was May 1, 2023 and funds are awarded on a first-come, first-served basis. Staff submitted our CalAPP Program Grant application on April 19, 2023 to meet this deadline. This is a reimbursable grant that allows for reimbursements through May 1, 2027.

If adopted, the proposed resolution would retroactively authorize the City Manager, or designee, to apply for the CalAPP Program Grant, to execute the grant agreement, and to implement a budget amendment if the City is awarded funds.

Action Taken: The City Council adopted Resolution No. 2023-R34 retroactively authorizing the City Manager, or designee, to apply for, receive, and appropriate grant funds for the California Energy Commission's *California Automated Permit Processing (CalAPP) Program Grant*, on Consent Calendar.

3-K. HSIP CYCLE 9 GARFIELD AVENUE TRAFFIC SIGNAL IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT – AWARD OF CONTRACT

Per Resolution 2022-R32, the Public Works Director solicited bids for Capital Improvement Project No. 96028. The bid opening was held on March 23, 2023. Staff completed review of bids and recommends that the contract be awarded to PTM General Engineering Services, Inc., the lowest responsible bidder, in the amount of \$428,028 plus 9% contingency.

CEQA (CALIFORNIA ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY ACT):

The proposed project is categorically exempt from the requirements of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) pursuant to 14 California Code of Regulations §15301 as a Class 1 categorical exemption (Existing Facilities). The project results in minor alterations to existing public facilities involving no significant

expansion of the existing use. The Project is not anticipated to have any significant impacts with regards to traffic, noise, air quality or water quality.

Action Taken: The City Council authorized the City Manager to execute a public works contract, in a form approved by the City Attorney, with PTM General Engineering Services, Inc. of Riverside in the contract amount of \$428,028 for the HSIP Cycle 9 Garfield Avenue Traffic Signal Improvements, Specification No. 2022-016; and authorized the Director of Public Works to approve change orders and contingency up to \$37,572, or 9% of the contract amount, on Consent Calendar.

COUNCIL COMMUNICATIONS

Council Member Lo stated his attendance at the San Gabriel Valley Public Affairs Network on April 20th. He also announced that he attended a luncheon at NBC Seafood Restaurant on April 21st hosted Assembly Member Mike Fong and in attendance were Assembly Speaker Designee Robert Rivas, Assembly Member Josh Lowenthal and Blanca Pacheco who toured the San Gabriel Valley area. He also communicated that he went to Earth Day on April 22nd hosted by the Alhambra Youth Democrats; and also attended a Trans Day Visibility event in the City of El Monte sponsored by the San Gabriel LGBT Center; Monterey Park Police Departments Town Hall Meeting on April 26th; Monterey Park Women's Club Charity Fashion Show; and the Alhambra Unified School Districts (AUSD) reading event.


Mayor Pro Tem Wong requested the discussion on SB710.
